

JOHN ETCHEBARREN FATALLY HURT WHEN SPEEDING AUTO OVERTURNS AND PINS PASSENGERS TO GROUND

Reno Hotel Man Receives Injuries; Matt and John Jauregui Badly Hurt but Will Recover; Accident Occurs on Road Between Moana Springs and Reno

Three persons were injured, one probably fatally, when an automobile going 50 miles an hour ran into a ditch and turned over between Moana Springs and Reno yesterday afternoon:

The injured

JOHN ETCHEBARREN, proprietor of the Commercial hotel; broken left shoulder; internal injuries; left hip crushed; may die.

MATT JAUREGUI, head badly cut and other bruises, possibly injured internally, will recover.

JOHN JAUREGUI, both wrists cut and face lacerated; will recover

Miraculous Escape

The three had a miraculous escape from instant death when Matt Jauregui, driving his big Cadillac, attempted to turn out to avoid a collision with an auto belonging to the Verdi Lumber company, the occupants of which were racing with Jauregui. Just ahead of the machines was a loaded hay wagon, and Jauregui had to choose between crashing into the other automobile, the hay wagon or running far out on the road. In attempting to swerve his car it hit a mighty boulder and was literally

hurled into a ditch, turning over twice

Etchebarren was pinned under the tonneau and was unconscious when the car was lifted. Matt and John Jauregui had been thrown clear of the tumbling machine.

The three men were hurried at once to Reno and taken to St. George's hospital, where Dr. C. E. Mooser made a thorough examination and dressed their wounds.

Dr. Mooser Hopes for Best

Last night Dr. Mooser expressed hope that Etchebarren would recover although he declared that he was badly hurt, and there is fear that internal injuries, indicated by repeated hemorrhages, may be more serious than apparent.

Matt Jauregui, while apparently recovering speedily, last night could not recall anything about the accident, not even realizing that he had been out in his automobile. Dr. Mooser doubts that he has been injured internally, explaining his lapse of memory as the result of shock

John Jauregui was not badly injured, according to Dr. Mooser

The machine, which was the property of Matt Jauregui, was badly smashed, but it was brought to Reno under its own power.
