FRENCH PIONEER DIES SUDDENLY.

STOCKMAN OF EARLY DAYS IS
CALLED AWAY.

Uncle of French Consular Agent and One of Founders of Local Colony of His Countrymen Stricken by Heart Affection Passes After Brief Sickness.

Funeral services will be conducted at St. Mary's Church at 10 o'clock this morning for Vincent Sentous, uncle of the French Consular Agent and one of the pioneers of his nationality in Southern California. M. Sentous died suddenly at his ranch home at Walnut Saturday morning of heart trouble. He had been slightly indisposed with a cold for some days but the end was unexpected. He was 53 years old. Interment is to be at Calvary Cemetery.

M. Sentous was a native of France and came to this country with his brothers while all were young men. They came to California and engaged in sheep ranching, which later developed into dealing in meat and finally into the Sentous Packing Company. He owned a large stock ranch at Walnut and was regarded as one of the most successful farmers in this section.

He was a former member of the Chamber of Commerce of Los Angeles and took a prominent part in advancing the city's interests in various ways. He was noted for his charitable activities among the needy French and the poor of other nationalities as well.

He leaves a widow, who before her marriage in 1895, was Miss Zelia Meysan, daughter of the late Charles Meysan of Inyo county, a brother, Jean, who still lives in France; a sister, Mrs. Jean Cazaux of Hollywood, and several nephews and nieces.
