He voiced a strong protest against militarism, which he characterized as the religion of Germany, because of her philosophy that might makes right. Should Germany win this war, he declared, militarism will be established world-wide.

"When we come to establish peace," he said, "there will be two factors to decide—whether we will advocate the disarmament of all nations, or whether the standing armies and navies shall be strengthened. The future civilization all depends on which course is pursued. If the latter, will it not be a constant temptation to war?"
